Overview

Mechanism

Healthcare Administration: Policies and oversight structures exist, but they do not ensure improved patient outcomes.

Technology and AI Governance: Ethical guidelines and review processes are established but have limited impact on real system behavior.

Implications

Governance drift creates systems that appear controlled and accountable but fail to correct or prevent problems.

Over time, this leads to:

- Repeated failures without meaningful change
- Loss of trust in oversight structures
- Increased systemic risk
- A gap between formal accountability and real responsibility

Reality Drift Context

Governance drift is a clear institutional form of Reality Drift because it shows how oversight can remain formally intact while losing contact with the outcomes it is meant to protect.

Boards still meet, committees still review, policies still exist, and compliance processes still run, but the system increasingly proves that governance occurred rather than proving that reality was constrained. As information moves upward through reports, dashboards, and approval layers, accountability becomes easier to document than to enforce.
